YOUTH EXCHANGE SUCCESS

Last year Boys' and Girls' Clubs of Wales hosted our German friends from TSV Eltingen at the eleventh annual Youth Exchange. The Youth Exchange took place at Brecon and Pendine over twelve days with sixty young people taking part in cultural activities and team building activities which included canoeing, climbing and surfing.

These activities provided young people with an opportunity to gain new skills and learn about each other's cultures. This was a new experience for the young people from the many Boys' and Girls' Clubs that took part. The exchange took on an extra significance as it took place exactly 100 years since World War 1 which provided an extra focus to the exchange as young people were able to reflect and learn about the sacrifices made by people from both countries. TRIBUTE TO ALAN LLOYD MBE

Boys' and Girls' Clubs of Wales is saddened to inform the membership that our popular Chairman, Alan Lloyd MBE, passed away suddenly on 24 January 2015 at the age of 76. Alan was the Chairman of the Organisation for the past four years.

Alan's involvement with the Organisation started in 1956 when he was capped for Boys' Clubs of Wales against Germany at the Vetch Field, Swansea. Alan strongly believed that it was his involvement in sport and his belonging to Mumbles Rangers Boys' Club that enabled him to stay on the right track in his formative years and helped shape his success in life.

Alan went on to play football for Gloucester City and Llanelli Town whilst carving a successful career in the Police Force which included being the Chairman of the South Wales Police Federation and Joint Chairman of the whole of Wales Police Federation.

Alan formed Langland Bay Lifeguards Club in 1974 and continued to be instrumental in the Club's success over the next forty years which included the building of a clubhouse at Langland Bay. Alan played a prominent role in the local community of Mumbles as well as being a well-respected figure in the Royal Lifesaving Society RLSS) within the UK.

In 1998 Alan took a greater interest in the Organisation when his club became members and played a role on the Swansea Group of Boys' and Girls' Clubs Committee as Secretary. This led to him taking an even more active role within the national organisation with him becoming Vice Chairman in 2008 and then Chairman in 2011.

National Development Officer, Grant Poiner, said

"I first met Alan when I was 16 as a member of Langland Bay Lifeguards Club where Alan was the leader. Years later, when I successfully landed the Swansea Officer role for the Swansea Group of Boys' and Girls' Clubs, I spoke with Alan only to find that he had played for the Boys' Clubs of Wales in 1956. Alan was keen for his club to affiliate so that young people could have access to other opportunities to develop."

Alan was proud to be awarded an MBE for services to lifesaving and young people in Wales in 2003 and Chief Executive, Joff Carroll said

"Alan was a forward thinking Chairman who was more than just a colleague, he was also a good friend. Alan believed that the Organisation would always give you a chance. Alan had his chance and enjoyed every minute of it and wanted others to benefit from being a part of Boys' and Girls' Clubs of Wales. He was inspirational and had a gift of supporting and encouraging those around him to realise their full potential. He will be sadly missed."

Alan achieved a lot during his time as Chairman. He was keen to ensure that the Organisation was sustainable and was on a stable financial footing and this is something which was achieved under his tenure. He was very keen to acknowledge the commitment of the volunteers and was instrumental in organising two volunteer presentation dinners to thank those who have organised sporting activities for young people and those who have dedicated many years to running Boys' and Girls' Clubs.

Finally, Alan was committed to redeveloping the Swansea Boys' Club in Mayhill, and had recently been involved in discussions to undertake a feasibility study to assess the community needs and viability of this ambitious scheme.

Alan will be greatly missed by all BGC Wales. Below we have included the final Chairman's Welcome which was written shortly before Alan's untimely passing.



Welcome everyone to the third edition of our newsletter @ BGC Wales. When I took over as Chairman, some four years ago, I had concerns about the direction in which the UK national organisation, Ambition, was heading. I, like many others, felt there had been a complete move away from providing the membership with an attractive, exciting and structured

programme of sport and activities and too much focus on other areas. Their decision to drop the National Boxing and Table Tennis Championships convinced us that there was no real purpose in continuing our association so we decided not to affiliate to Ambition for 2014/15.

After serving as Chairman of the South Wales Police Federation, and later the whole of Wales, I became familiar with 'politics' being ever present but what we have in this Organisation is an overwhelming desire to support and provide opportunities for young people and I, personally, don't see any 'politics'. I am proud of what our panel

members, leaders and volunteers have achieved. I recently attended both the football and rugby dinners and what I felt was a distinct warmth coming from both events – a legacy of the great work put in by the people supporting these activities and the young people who participate.

We continue to develop and add quality to our service to young people. The launch of the Club Handbook at the Senedd was well received by Ministers, Assembly Members and youth work practitioners who attended.

We have started a new section in our newsletters – 'Where are they now?' - which features on those who have attained international success and those unsung heroes who have made such a valuable contribution to the Organisation.

I will conclude by thanking our brilliant staff at HQ for all their efforts – Joff and Grant for their sterling work in 2014 and Shirley who will, amazingly, have been with the Organisation for fifty years in September. BGC Wales continues to go places and I am proud to be going there with them.

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

On Tuesday 11th November BGC Wales staff members and local supporters - including Mr and Mrs Jack Hardman of Barry, Rev Jean Humphries (ex Secretary, Christian Education Movement) and family, and retired Power Station workers Mick Lobb and Ted Higgins - gathered to commemorate Armistice Day at St Athan Boys' Village to mark the 100th year since World War I. Now a mass of derelict buildings, St Athan Boys' Village was once a thriving holiday destination for the mining communities of South Wales.

The memorial stands in the centre of the Village and the inscription reads "Ar y Ddaear Tagnefedd i Ddynion - Ewyllys Da" ("Peace on Earth and Goodwill to All Men"). It was placed there to commemorate the fallen from both World Wars. Since 1930 the memorial has stood 'with a simple yet impressive dignity' as it still does today. A minute's silence was held and then a wreath was placed on the memorial. We will remember them.

I can now say I love Welshcakes, I understand rugby, Welsh people are so friendly, I am always meeting new people and Wales has a lot to offer.

I encourage all Welsh young people to look into EVS as it is the best way to learn about a new culture, meet different people, learn a language and discover new places. Do not miss the opportunity; you will never regret doing it!

I lived in Madrid with my family until last year when I came to London to improve my English. I studied a Marketing and Public Relations Degree and a Digital Marketing and Social Media Master and, after that, I started working for an international organisation, trying to combine work with my basketball team, summer camps as a group leader and a basketball coach. Always busy, but always fun! My hobbies have always been playing basketball, going out with friends, hiking and travelling around the world.

As to the future I don't know yet - maybe try to find a job in Wales or continue travelling - we'll see...



We already have a programme of activities in place for delivery in 2015, we hope to grow and improve that for subsequent years.

We have come a long way in the last year or so and we believe that through the network of mutual support we will continue to grow and (more importantly) meet the needs of our members.
